Staff meeting at UP



On Friday, the 2nd September the staff members teaching theological subjects had the first introductory session with the various heads of departments in the theological faculty at the University of Pretoria [UP] to establish the Joint Supervisory Board to regulate the academic program to be offered in cooperation and partnership between UP and LTS starting 2012.

From the LTS Rev. David Tswaedi DD [Biblical Studies], Rev. Nathan Mntambo [Practical Studies] and Bishop Dr. Wilhelm Weber [Dogmatic Studies] were accompanied by Rev. Dr. Carl Rockrohr [Mission and Ethics] and Prof. Dr. Timothy Quill [LCMS Theological Education worldwide].

On the side of UP it was Prof. Dr. Johan Buitendag and his team consisting of the following professors Julian Müller DD [Adjunct dean]; Yolande Dreyer DD; Danie Veldsman DD [Dogmatics/Ethics]; Ernest

van Eck DD [New Testament] and Pieter Venter DD [Old Testament]. Prof. Henk

Potgieter [Head of ancient languages Greek and Hebrew] was attended by Dr. Jo-Mari Schräder.

Professor Julian Müller DD was elected chairman of the Supervisory Board and Rev. Dr. Carl Rockrohr as the secretary.

Together we discussed the implications of the agreement between UP/LTS and planned the best way forward. It was decided that those teaching the same subjects would work together to familiarize us from the LTS with the subjects offered at the theological faculty of UP so that we too would be in the position to offer the required options for the BTh, BA [Theology] and diploma in theology. We are hopeful that this will significantly improve the options open to Lutherans from Africa to study academic theology and that prospective pastors of the Lutheran Church will benefit from attaining such an accredit degree too.

After the next meeting in the beginning of November was decided on, Bishop Dr. Weber handed over the complete volume of Lutheran Dogmatics in Zulu written by his father Rev. E.A.W.Weber DD and published with the help of the Lutheran Heritage foundation to Dean Buitendag in appreciation for his astute leadership and his success in realizing this academic partnership between UP and LTS.

This year 2011 we have five post-graduate students enrolled at UP and further three vicars posted in various congregations.

At Masters level we have both **Rev**. Mbongeni John Nkambule [Deputy dean of the LCSA in Gauteng and pastor in Naledi/Mothlakeng] busy with Mission studies and also Rev. Orapeleng Godfrey **Shuping** [Pastor in the LCSA serving in the Tsetse congregation in the North-West province] busy with Systematic studies on ecclessiology. At the Honours level we have vicar Abia Peter Anibati from Sudan in New Testament, vicar Eric Ghebotoe from Liberia in Mission studies and finally vicar Bheki Ngobese from the LCSA in Mpumalanga doing Systematics. All five are progressing very encouragingly and all are confident that they will complete their respective courses at the end of this year.

Vicar Moses Mokopanele was first posted at the LTS, then for some time un-

der the tutelage of Rev. Tswaedi DD in Mofolo-N. [Soweto] and from this month he has been granted the opportunity to continue his studies at Westfield House, Cambridge [UK]. For this opportunity we are very grateful and as he already has obtained his visa successfully we foresee no further obstacles. Vicar Phenyo Mokgaimena, who is enrolled with the Mission of Lutheran Churches [MLC] is serving under the guidance of Rev. Paul Mosenogi in the Lutheran Church in Gaborone, Botswana.

Vicar Silas Mogale finally is a the only vicar serving in the diocese from which he originated—namely North-West Province. He is being mentored by Rev. Mathulwe in Ramathlabama and like the rest of the vicars is looking forward to the final stages of his vicarage, which is to be topped up by a final examination and then a ordination course—hopefully and God willing around Easter in 2012.




What an honor to administer these gifts to
