After an eleven hour flight from Johannesburg, South Africa, I arrived at Heathrow Airport in early morning on the 19th of September. I have been studying here at Westfield for almost two months now. My classes consist of Greek Readings, Pericope Exegetics, and Christology here at Westfield House, and I take Introduction to Islam and Islamic Philosophy at the Divinity Faculty of Cambridge University. We also have in-house classes for Islam.

I was given the opportunity to interview Preceptor Reg Quirk about the Seminary here and its relationship with the LTS in Pretoria. The Preceptor is willing to accept LTS students as long as the Church in South Africa continues to send candidates. They do not allow individuals to apply, but are happy to accept those sent by the Church.



The Preceptor thinks that this is a good opportunity for me to experience a very different educational system and standard. Although the classes are difficult at times, I am very happy to have this opportunity. If the Church allows me to continue my studies in England, then I would be able to continue at London University.

Cambridge is a beautiful, quiet, and safe place. I have had the chance to see much of the city and to enjoy the local history. From the King's College Chapel to punting on the River Cam, visiting the various colleges that make up the University, I have very much enjoyed the sites.

I am staying in Luther Hall, which houses all the Westfield students. We have students from America, Mexico, Germany, Madagascar, Ghana, Croatia, Slovakia, Thailand, India, Finland, and, of course, England. Women's guild help students

Some of the students of the Seminary do not belong to any medical aid. The Women's Guild of our congregation has provided funds for their medical care when they get sick or need to see a medical doctor. In most cases the Women's Guild provides transport to the academic hospital or a clinic, where they are treated free of charge, and also pays basic costs for medication.

At the dental hospital the foreign students have to pay a small amount for each visit and treatment, this is covered by the Women's Guild.

Some students need eye care and in that case they are taken to an optometrist, i.e. one who

works in conjunction with the Lions Club of South Africa, who support this cause. There their eyes are then tested and if they need a pair of glasses, they get them from the optometrist at a nominal fee covered by the Women's Guild.

The Women's Guild also employs a cleaner, who comes every 2nd week and helps keep the Seminary and chapel buildings tidy by helping to clean the student residences, the library, lecture rooms and chapel. This is a welcome support of the Seminary efforts to keep the well used premises tidy and taken good care of.

Go well, you did well!




Rev. E.A.W.Weber DD (on the right) taught about the history of the Lutheran Church in Southern Africa at the LTS over the past weeks. He emphasized some vital documents from the 1960's and 70's, which give an insight into the foundational stages of our Church. Even though most of our students are not from the LCSA, these doctrinal statements are relevant to any confessional Lutheran Church in Africa. His personal experience and insight make these lectures valuable for our heritage and we are looking forward to publish the written lectures as soon as possible. We are grateful that with these lectures my father was able to conclude the three sessions of African Church History taught at the LTS in the past Semester.

The first section was taught by another father of the African Lutheran Church: Rev. Dr. Anssi Simojoki from Finland, who gave a general introduction to the History of the Church on this African continent. As a confessional



teacher of Lutheran theology in many parts of Africa for some decades, he was able to go into some very specific details concerning the developments of especially the confessional Lutheran Church in those countries, where our students originate from.

The second session was taught by our friend and colleague Rev. Radikobo Ntsimane from the Lutheran Theological Institute in Pietermaritzburg. He gave an orientation to the history of the Church in South Africa. As an expert in oral traditions, but also familiar with the South African academia this proved to be a very enlightening, if challenging intensive study for our students. Rev. Ntsimane was the previous rector of our Seminary and we are very hopeful that this stint at the LTS will be the start of a renewed and intensified exchange between him and our Seminary. The best scenario would off course be, if he could return full-time to the LTS. With God all things are possible and he has often showed the way, where we only saw obstacles.
